Students on a ministerial path are expected to govern their conduct to be above reproach, whether here at Unity Institute or elsewhere. It is important that students present themselves as true representatives of the principles of Truth as taught and exemplified by Jesus Christ and interpreted by Unity.

Registration

Enrollment in a class is not official until the proper registration forms have been processed by the Registrar and all financial obligations have been paid or approved arrangements for payment have been made. No one is permitted to attend a course for which he or she is not officially registered, unless approved by the Dean.

Assessment of Transfer of Credit

Students may transfer up to 12 hours of graduate credit in the Master of Divinity program and up to six hours of graduate credit in the Master of Arts program. Students in the Certificate in Unity Ministry may transfer up to 12 hours of undergraduate credit. Transfer credit is not used in calculating a student's grade point average (GPA) at Unity Institute.

NOTE: The following policy and procedures are for assessing transcripts and courses. They do not guarantee that credit will be transferred into Unity Institute.

Policy

1. Any course submitted for consideration of transfer of credit must have been completed within seven years of beginning a program at Unity Institute.
2. Only work from accredited institutions approved by the U.S. Department of Education may be credited toward a Unity Institute program. Transfer requests from students with credits from international educational institutions will be considered on a case-by-case basis.
3. Only work at a grade of B (3.0) or above from accredited institutions may be considered for credit. Pass/Fail and Credit/No credit courses will be considered for transfer only if the institution's catalog clearly states the Pass or Credit grade is equivalent to a B (3.0). Transferred credit will appear on Unity Institute transcripts with a grade of TR (Transfer Credit), and will not be used in calculating a student's Grade Point Average (GPA) at Unity Institute.
4. Transfer credit will be granted only for courses that are congruent with Unity Institute courses, as assessed by the Academic Review Committee, composed of the Registrar, the Dean of Unity Institute, and the faculty from the department of the courses being considered for transfer credit.
5. A maximum of 12 hours may be allowed for transfer to the M.Div. program, and six hours for the M.A. program. Normally, hours will transfer as elective hours and will not count toward the core curriculum. Only graduate-level courses will be considered for transfer credit.
6. If a student who is enrolled in one degree program decides to pursue the other degree program, the courses completed will be transferred, according to the specific requirements of the program into which the student transfers.

7. Undergraduate course credit from an accredited institution will be considered for transfer credit for students enrolled in the Certificate in Unity Ministry program. A maximum of 12 credit hours (equal to 17 continuing education units) may be allowed for transfer. Normally, hours will transfer as elective units and will not count toward the core curriculum.

Procedure for Requesting Assessment of Transfer Credit

1. The student is to write a letter of request to the Unity Institute Registrar. The letter is to include the following:
 - a) Name and location of the school where the courses were taken.
 - b) Name of the courses taken, including department and course codes.
 - c) Name of the degree that the student is seeking at Unity Institute.
2. The student will need to submit supporting documents. Supporting documents include:
 - a) Official transcript. (A copy of the transcript in a student's admission or academic file at Unity Institute is acceptable for this purpose.)
 - b) A catalog from the school where the courses were taken, preferably from the time when the courses were taken. If a full catalog cannot be submitted, include the following:
 - i) Statement of accreditation, usually found near the front of the catalog.
 - ii) Explanation of grades and grade point equivalents (GPA), found in the catalog, unless grade explanations appear on the transcript.
 - iii) Explanation of course numbers, unless course numbers on the transcript are clearly identified as graduate courses.
 - iv) Course descriptions from the school's catalog of the year when the courses were taken.
 - v) Explanation of semester hour equivalency if courses are credited by quarter hours.
 - vi) A syllabus for each course.
 - vii) Additional material, such as papers or exams written for the course, may be required.
3. Transcripts and supporting documents will be evaluated only during ten-week terms.
4. After courses are assessed, the Registrar prepares a letter summarizing the results. The student, the student's faculty advisor and the Registrar will receive copies of the letter. The Registrar will update the student's academic records accordingly.

Auditing a Class

Auditing a class is available to any student once he or she has been admitted to Unity Institute. Auditors should talk with faculty about what is expected of them in each class. Regular attendance in the class is expected of all auditors. A class being audited may not be changed for credit after the last day to add a class. However, a class being taken for credit may be changed to audit any time up to the last day to drop, as identified in the academic calendar. Students will be assessed a \$25 fee to drop the course. Refunds will be issued based on the refund policy explained in the Unity Institute Catalog and Student Handbook.

Only regularly scheduled classroom courses may be audited. Not all courses are available for audit. Students who successfully complete an audit will receive a grade of AU. This indicates regular attendance and involvement in an audited course. Academic credit is not received and hours are not computed in the grade point average.

Students who withdraw from or who are unsuccessful in the audit receive a grade of WA. This indicates that regular attendance and/or requirements were not satisfactorily fulfilled for an audited course and/or the student withdrew from the course.

Independent Study

A student may arrange to study a subject, not parallel with the content of any other course offering, by independent study using requirements established individually with a Unity Institute faculty member. A fee, in addition to the tuition, will be assessed. The student and faculty member will prepare a syllabus outlining the reading, research and writing requirements for successful completion of the course. Grades for the independent study are due at the end of the academic term in which the student enrolled.

Readmission to Unity Institute

If a student has not maintained continuous enrollment (see below) at Unity Institute, formal application must again be made. If necessary, the Admissions Committee will review the applicant's file to determine if the student should be readmitted. All outstanding financial obligations must also be satisfied before re-admission is granted.

The program requirements and academic standards that were effective upon initial enrollment will be applicable only if the student is readmitted after an absence of no more than two terms. For the student not enrolled for three or more consecutive ten week terms, the program requirements and academic standards that are currently in effect at the time of readmission will be applicable.

To be considered for readmission, candidates must submit the following:

1. A completed application form.
2. Reapplication fee of \$50.
3. Written statement of information of no more than 1000 words to include reasons for seeking readmission to Unity Institute.
4. Official transcripts from each college or university attended since last enrolled at Unity Institute.

FINANCIAL INFORMATION AND POLICIES

Tuition

Unity Institute may change the charges and fees listed below, in accordance with established policies and procedures. Fees are the same for audited and credit courses. Accounts must be paid in full at the time of registration.

Financial Accountability

Students who are not current with payments to Unity for rent, phone, tuition, library returns, printing charges, textbooks, etc., may have their grades and/or graduation withheld until such payments are made.

Financial Assistance and Scholarships

Financial assistance in the form of tuition and a limited number of scholarships are available from the Unity Institute Scholarship Fund. Tuition aid is available, term by term, based upon financial need, academic ability and spiritual presence. Further information and application forms are available online. The deadline for receipt of tuition aid applications is one month prior to the beginning of a term.

Nonprogram students are not eligible for tuition aid or scholarships.

Health Insurance

Unity Institute strongly encourages students to maintain adequate health insurance while enrolled at Unity Institute. Health insurance information packets are available upon request from the Registrar.

Payment of Accounts

All accounts must be paid in full at the time of registration. Students are responsible for the total tuition and other miscellaneous charges even though a third party may reimburse the student. Unity Institute accepts MasterCard, Visa, Discover and American Express.

Refunds

In any instance of adding, dropping or withdrawing from courses, the student must complete a Change of Schedule form available from the Registrar. The date the form is returned and processed by the Registrar is the date used for the purpose of issuing refunds. All fees are nonrefundable. Tuition refunds are given on the following basis:

Students who feel their individual circumstances warrant an exception from the above stated policies may appeal in writing. The appeal should include a statement of the exception being requested, an explanation as to why an exception should be granted, and appropriate materials to support the request for the exception. The appeal letter and supporting material is to be sent to the Dean within two weeks. The decision of the Dean is final.

Textbooks

Students should plan to spend \$50–\$100 or more *per course* for their textbooks and other reading material.

Transcript Requests

Federal law requires that all transcript requests be made in writing and include the student's written signature. Requests for a transcript should also include:

- The student's name and, if applicable, maiden name.
- Date of last attendance or degree earned with date of graduation.
- Date of birth.
- Social security number.
- Name and address where transcript should be sent.
- Signature authorizing release of the transcript.

Official transcripts bearing the Unity Institute seal are sent to the person or place designated by the student. Transcripts are issued in their entirety and no partial transcripts will be issued. Transcripts will not be released if the student's financial account is not current.

Official transcripts are prepared with the student's name at time of graduation.

GENERAL INFORMATION FOR ALL STUDENTS

Academic Honesty

Unity Institute assumes that all students desire to pursue their academic and transformational work with honesty and scholarly integrity. Students may obtain assistance from others as long as the student submitting the assignment is actually the author of the work. Activities that have the effect or intention of interfering with the education, pursuit of knowledge or fair evaluation of a student's performance are prohibited. These include, but are not limited to, cheating, plagiarism, facilitating academic dishonesty and misrepresentation of self or other students. Those students who breach these standards will face sanctions, ranging from course failure to dismissal from the program.

Cheating involves the use or attempt to use unauthorized assistance, material or study aids in examinations or other academic work. This also includes submitting course work based on contrived or altered information, data and/or sources.

Plagiarism is the use of ideas, words or thoughts of another and passing them off as one's own. This includes:

- Incorporating portions from a printed or online book or article into a paper and not acknowledging the source.
- Purchasing or copying a whole paper or report directly from a book, article or another person.
- Use of another student's work in any form without acknowledging the source.

Facilitating academic dishonesty involves helping or attempting to help another student violate any provision of this code.

Misrepresentation of self or another includes dishonestly portraying a person or situation or falsifying, forging or altering any academic record.

If a faculty member discovers a student violating academic honesty, the following penalty may be applied, depending upon the severity of the infraction:

- A reduced grade for the assignment.
- A grade of zero for the assignment.
- An "F" for the course.
- Remand the decision to the full faculty.

If remanded to the full faculty, they may:

- Affirm the decision of the faculty member.
- Place the student on probation.
- Recommend the student's dismissal from the program.

A report will be sent to the faculty and the Dean, as well as kept in the student's permanent file.

Academic Records

A permanent academic record is kept for each student in an academic file (paper and/or computerized) in the Unity Institute office. All grades earned by the student at Unity Institute are recorded. The record also shows the credits transferred from other graduate schools that apply toward meeting the student's degree requirements at Unity Institute. Credits from other schools that do not meet Unity Institute degree requirements are not posted. At the end of each term, the grades earned and the grade point average are recorded for courses in which the student is officially enrolled. Only courses dropped during the drop period are omitted. Cumulative hours attempted and earned, as well as the cumulative grade point average, are posted at the conclusion of each term's listing of courses and grades.

All papers and assignments produced by students are to meet the standards required for citation and attribution of sources defined by the Chicago Style. Students may find Kate L. Turabian's *A Manual for Writers of Term Papers, Theses and Dissertations*, published by the University of Chicago Press to be a useful reference.

Appeal Process

Appeals for exceptions to academic policies and regulations are to be submitted in writing, with documentation, to the Dean, whose decision is final.

Appeals involving grades. Grade disputes must first be discussed with the relevant faculty member. If the issue cannot be resolved with the faculty member, the student may submit an appeal in writing, with documentation, to the Dean within four weeks of the faculty member's decision. The decision of the Dean is final. Failure to initiate an appeal within the four-week time frame indicates that the student accepts the decision of the faculty member as final and the matter is closed. In the event that the Dean is also the faculty member involved, the student may submit the appeal in writing, with documentation, to the Chair of the Academic Governance Council, whose decision is final.

Appeals involving a student's status in the program. Students may be placed on academic probation or academic suspension for failure to meet academic, ethical or other standards in the Code of Conduct.

Probation allows a student to continue course work at a reduced course load (maximum of nine credit hours per ten-week term or three credit hours per three-week term). If the student is placed on probation during an academic term, the student is required to reduce his/her course load immediately to meet this requirement. Any course(s) is dropped without refund and without the ability to transfer any work to a future term. Ministerial participation in churches will be decided by the faculty on a case-by-case basis. Students will meet with their advisors to develop a plan for improvement.

Suspension is a period of involuntary separation from coursework during which time the student has the opportunity to grow through a plan for remediation. If the student is suspended during an academic term, the student is automatically dropped from all of his/her courses without refund and without the ability to transfer any work to a future term. Students may be allowed to attend, but may not participate in, functions at Unity Institute.

Appeals of probation and suspension may be presented to the Chair of the Academic Governance Council in writing, with documentation, within four weeks of receiving official notice of status change. The decision of the Chair is final. Failure to initiate an appeal within the four-week time frame indicates that the student accepts the decision of probation/suspension as final and the matter is closed.

Appeals involving a student's dismissal from the program. Unity Institute reserves the right to dismiss a student from the program if his or her academic performance, attitude and/or behavior do not meet the standards prescribed in the Unity Institute Catalog and the Unity Institute Code of Conduct. Appeals involving a student's dismissal from the program may be presented in writing to the Chair of the Academic Governance Council, with documentation, within four weeks of receiving official notice of dismissal. The Dean will determine whether the student may continue to attend classes during the appeal process. The decision of the Chair is final. Failure to initiate an appeal within the four-week time frame indicates that the student accepts the decision of dismissal as final and the matter is closed.

Attendance

In general, attendance at all classes is strongly encouraged and seen as key to successful completion of each course. However, attendance may be more important in some courses, and absences may affect a student's grade. Students should consult the syllabus and faculty for each course for specific attendance policies.

Class Cancellation

All course offerings are subject to enrollment minimums. Unity Institute reserves the right to cancel classes for which there is insufficient enrollment.

Code of Conduct

All students are expected to conduct themselves according to the Unity Institute Code of Conduct.

1. Dedication to Spiritual Principles
 - I act in a dignified manner, which models the high standards of someone following a spiritual path, guided by wisdom and good judgment.
 - Prayer is a central part of my spiritual practice.
 - I live by principles compatible with the Unity way of life.
2. Relationship with Others
 - I am responsible for maintaining respectful interactions with others.
 - I maintain healthy boundaries, which include acting in a sexually appropriate manner.
 - I respect other points of view.
 - I hold sacred all confidences given to me.
 - I communicate honestly and compassionately with others.
 - My behavior follows the legal and ethical standards of the community in which I live.
3. Honoring Myself
 - I practice healthy spiritual, psychological and physical self-care.

- I am teachable.
 - I speak my truth with kindness.
 - I engage in self-exploration.
4. Relationship with Unity Institute
- My conduct reflects the mission and values of Unity Institute.
 - I adhere to ethical academic practices.
 - In the classroom, I act in a manner that is considerate of others.
 - I honor appointments and time schedules.
 - I am responsible for my part in building community consciousness within Unity Institute.

The development of ministerial presence and spiritual consciousness is especially important for people interested in becoming Unity ministers. Unity Institute assumes that all students, having signed the Unity Institute Code of Conduct, desire to complete their education here with honesty and personal integrity. Those students who breach the standards outlined in the Code of Conduct will face sanctions ranging from probation to dismissal from the program. If the student who has violated the Code of Conduct has also signed the Code of Ethics of the Association of Unity Churches International, notice is also sent to the Credentialed Leader/Ministry Review System (CLMRS).

Dress Code

Students are expected to attend classes Monday through Wednesday in business casual attire. Students with classes on Thursday or Friday or in the evenings may wear casual attire, defined as casual clothing that is clean and neat (e.g., jeans, t-shirts, sweatshirts and tennis shoes). Attire such as shorts, tights, shirts with inappropriate logos/slogans and flip-flop sandals are not acceptable at any time.

Students who are involved in services, rituals and/or other ministerial activities are expected to dress professionally.

Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act

Unity Institute complies with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). FERPA affords students certain rights with respect to their academic records. They are:

- **The right to inspect and review the student's academic records within 45 days of the day Unity Institute receives a request for access.** Students should submit to the Registrar a written request that identifies the record(s) they wish to inspect. The Registrar will arrange for access and notify the student of the time and place where the records may be inspected.
- **The right to request the amendment of the student's academic record that the student believes is inaccurate or misleading.** Students should submit a letter to the Registrar clearly identifying the part of the record that they believe is inaccurate or misleading, stating why it is inaccurate or misleading and asking for the record to be changed. If Unity Institute decides not to amend the record as requested by the student, the student will be notified of the decision and advised of his or her right to a hearing regarding the request for amendment. Additional information regarding the hearing process will be provided at that time.

- The right to consent to disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records, except to the extent that FERPA authorizes disclosure without consent. One exception, which permits disclosure without consent, is disclosure to school officials with legitimate educational interests.
- The right to file a complaint with the U.S. Department of Education concerning alleged failures by Unity Institute to comply with the requirements of FERPA. The name and address of the office that administers FERPA is:

Unity Institute Policy on Student Records

Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to set forth the guidelines governing the protection of the privacy of student records and to implement the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974. These regulations apply to all students who are attending Unity Institute.

Definitions

1. "Act" means the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974, as amended, enacted as Section 444 of the General Education Provisions Act.
2. "Student" means any person who is or has been in attendance at Unity Institute where Unity Institute maintains education records or personally identifiable information on such person.
3. "Attendance" at Unity Institute includes, but is not limited to:
 - a. The period of time during which a student attends Unity Institute. (e.g., academic year, term, etc.).
 - b. This word does not include specific daily records of a student's attendance at Unity Institute.
4. "Directory Information" includes a student's:
 - a. Name
 - b. Address
 - c. E-mail address
 - d. Telephone listing
 - e. Program in which the student is enrolled
5. "Personally identifiable information," includes:
 - a. Student's name.
 - b. Student's address, phone number, e-mail.
 - c. A personal identifier, such as the student's social security number or student number.
 - d. A list of personal characteristics that would make the student's identity easily traceable.
 - e. Other information that would make the student's identity easily traceable.
6. "Education Records" means those records that:
 - a. Directly relate to a student and are maintained by Unity Institute or by a party acting for Unity Institute.

- b. Relate to a student in attendance at Unity Institute who is employed as a result of his or her status as a student (e.g., Graduate Assistant, Research Assistant).
 - c. "Record" means information or data recorded in any medium, including, but not limited to handwriting, print, computer media, video or audio tape, film, microfilm, and microfiche.
- The term does NOT include:
- a. Records of instructional, supervisory and administrative personnel and educational personnel ancillary thereto which are in the sole possession of the maker thereof, and which are not accessible or revealed to any other person except a temporary substitute for the maker of the record;
 - b. Records, files, documents and other materials of the Unity Security Department created by, created for, or maintained by the Unity Security Department.
 - c. Records maintained by Unity Human Resources Department relating to a student who is employed by Unity, that relate exclusively to that student's capacity as an employee, and are not available for use for any other purpose.
 - d. Records that contain only information about an individual after he or she is no longer a student at Unity Institute.
7. "Disclosure" means to permit access to or the release, transfer or other communication of personally identifiable information contained in education records to any party, by any means, including oral, written or electronic means.
8. "Institute Official" is:
- a. A person employed by Unity Institute in an administrative, faculty, supervisory, research, medical or staff position (including law enforcement personnel).
 - b. A person or company with whom Unity Institute has contracted (e.g., an attorney, mentor, spiritual counselor, auditor or collection agent).
 - c. A person serving on the Academic Governance Council.
 - d. A student serving on an official committee (e.g., a disciplinary or grievance committee).

Student Directory Information

Unity Institute may publish (disclose) directory information if it has given public notice to students in attendance at Unity Institute of:

- 1. The types of personally identifiable information that Unity Institute has designated as directory information (see B-4 above).
- 2. A student's right to refuse to have his or her information published in the directory, in which case only his or her name will be included in the directory.

Disclosing a Student's Educational Record or Personally Identifiable Information

- 1. Unity Institute may disclose personally identifiable information from an education record of a student when:
 - a. The student provides a signed and dated written consent, where the consent specifies the records that may be disclosed, the purpose of the disclosure, and identifies the party to whom the disclosure may be made (prior consent).

- b. The student requests a copy of the records that he or she has consented be disclosed.
2. Unity Institute may disclose personally identifiable information from an education record of a student without the consent of the student if the disclosure involves:
- a. Institute officials, as defined in paragraph 1 hereof, who have been determined by the Institute to have a legitimate educational interest and need to review an education record in order to fulfill his or her professional responsibility.
- A person has a legitimate educational interest if the official is:
- Performing a task that is specified in his or her position description or contract.
 - Performing a task related to a student's education.
 - Performing a task related to the discipline of a student.
 - Providing a service or benefit relating to the student or student's family, such as health care, counseling, job placement or financial aid.
 - Maintaining the safety or security of the campus.
- The custodian of the subject records on a case-by-case basis will make the determination as to whether a legitimate educational interest exists. When the custodian has any question regarding the request, the custodian should withhold disclosure unless the custodian obtains consent from the student or the concurrence from a supervisor or other appropriate official that the record may be released.
- b. A disciplinary proceeding at Unity Institute providing that Unity Institute determines that:
- The student is an alleged perpetrator of a crime of violence or nonforcible sex offense; and
 - With respect to the allegation made against him or her, the student has committed a violation of Unity Institute's rules or policies.
 - Unity Institute may not disclose the name of any other student, including a victim or witness, without the prior written consent of the other student.
- c. Officials of other schools to which the student seeks or intends to enroll, upon condition that the student is notified of the transfer, receives a copy of the record if requested, and has an opportunity for a hearing to challenge the content of the record.
- d. Authorized representatives of federal or state government with legitimate educational interests in connection with an audit or evaluation of federal or state supported education programs, or for the enforcement of or compliance with federal or state legal requirements, which relate to those programs. This disclosure will be protected in a manner that does not permit personal identification of individuals by anyone except the officials referred to and will be destroyed when no longer needed.
- e. In connection with financial aid—defined as a payment of funds provided to an individual that is conditioned on the individual's attendance at Unity Institute—for which the student has applied or which the student has received. This disclosure shall be limited to the determination of eligibility, amount and conditions of the aid.

- f. Organizations conducting studies for, or on behalf of, educational agencies or institutions to develop, validate or administer predictive tests; administer student aid programs; or improve instruction. Such studies are to be conducted in such a manner as will not permit the personal identification of students by persons other than representatives of the organization and this information will be destroyed when no longer needed.
- g. Accrediting organizations to carry out their accrediting functions.
- h. Compliance with a lawfully issued subpoena.
- i. Result of legal action initiated by either a student or Unity Institute. In either case, Unity Institute may disclose to the court, without a court order or subpoena, the student's education records that are relevant for Unity Institute to defend itself.
- j. A health or safety emergency, if the knowledge of such information is necessary to protect the health or safety of a student or other persons.
- k. A victim of an alleged perpetrator of a crime of violence or a nonforcible sex offense. The disclosure may include only the results of the disciplinary proceeding conducted by Unity Institute with respect to that alleged crime or offense. Unity Institute may disclose the results of the disciplinary proceeding, regardless of whether Unity Institute concluded a violation was committed.

Rights of the Student to Inspect and Review His or Her Education Records

1. Unity Institute shall provide students access to their educational records except as outlined in the section below (Limitation on Access).
2. Unity Institute shall comply with a request within a reasonable period, but in no case more than 45 days after the request has been received.
3. The Unity Institute Registrar shall respond to reasonable requests for explanations and interpretations of those records.
4. If circumstances prevent the student from exercising the right to inspect and review the student's education records in person, Unity Institute shall:
 - a. Provide the student with a copy of the records requested. (Unity Institute may impose a reasonable fee, not to exceed the actual cost of reproduction.)
 - b. Make other arrangements for the student to inspect and review the requested records.
5. Unity Institute shall not destroy education records if there is an outstanding request to inspect and review the records.

Limitation on Student Access of His or Her Education Record

Unity Institute may limit access to a student's education records in certain circumstances:

1. If the education records of a student contain information on more than one student, the student may inspect and review or be informed of only the specific information about that student.
2. The student has waived his or her right to inspect and review confidential letters and statements (e.g., letters of recommendation for admission to Unity Institute, letters accompanying an application for graduate assistantship).

Student's Right to Amend His or Her Education Records

1. If a student believes the education records relating to the student contain information that is inaccurate, misleading or in violation of the student's rights of privacy, he or she may ask Unity Institute to amend the record by contacting the Dean.
2. Unity Institute shall decide whether to amend the record as requested within a reasonable time after the request is received.
3. If Unity Institute decides not to amend the record as requested, the Unity Institute Registrar shall inform the student of the decision and of his or her right to a hearing.

Student's Right to a Hearing

1. Unity Institute shall give a student, on written request, an opportunity for a hearing to challenge the content of the student's education records on the grounds that the information contained in the education records is in violation of the privacy rights of the student.
2. If, as a result of the hearing, Unity Institute decides that the information is inaccurate, misleading or otherwise in violation of the privacy rights of the student, it shall both amend the record accordingly and inform the student of the amendment in writing.
3. If, as a result of the hearing, Unity Institute decides that the information in the education record is not inaccurate, misleading or otherwise in violation of the privacy rights of the student, it shall inform the student of the right to place a statement in the record commenting on the contested information in the record or stating why he or she disagrees with the decision of Unity Institute, or both.
4. If Unity Institute places a statement in the education records of a student, it shall keep the statement with the contested part of the record for as long as the record is maintained, and disclose the statement whenever it discloses the portion of the record to which the statement relates.

Conduct of a Hearing

Upon the written request of the student, a hearing will be conducted, using the following procedure:

1. The request for a hearing shall be submitted in writing to the Dean, who will appoint a hearing officer or a hearing committee to conduct the hearing. The hearing officer or committee shall not have a direct interest in the outcome of the hearing.
2. The hearing shall be conducted and decided within four weeks following the request for the hearing. Unity Institute shall give the student reasonable notice of the date, time and place of the hearing.
3. The hearing shall be conducted and the decision rendered by the appointed hearing official.
4. The student shall be afforded a full and fair opportunity to present evidence relevant to the hearing and may be assisted or represented by individuals of his or her choice at his or her own expense, including an attorney.
5. The decision of the hearing official shall be based solely upon the evidence presented at the hearing and shall include a summary of the evidence and the reasons for the decision.

6. The decision shall be rendered in writing within two weeks after the conclusion of the hearing.
7. Either party may appeal the decision of the hearing official or officials to the Dean.
8. The decision of the Vice President of Education is final.

Record Keeping

Unity Institute shall maintain a record of each request for access to and each disclosure of personally identifiable information from the education records of each student, for as long as the records are maintained. For each request or disclosure, the record must include:

1. The parties who have requested or received personally identifiable information from the education records.
2. The legitimate interests the parties had in requesting or obtaining the information.

If Unity Institute discloses personally identifiable information, the record of the disclosure must include:

1. The names of any additional parties, if any, to which the receiving party may disclose the information on behalf of Unity Institute.
2. The legitimate interests which each of the additional parties has in requesting or obtaining the information.

If Unity Institute determines that a third party improperly re-discloses personally identifiable information from education records, Unity Institute may not allow that third party access to personally identifiable information from education records for at least five years.

Unity Institute to Notify Students of Their Rights under FERPA

Unity Institute shall annually notify students currently in attendance of their rights under the Act in both the catalog and student handbook. This notice must include:

1. A student's right to inspect and review the student's education records.
2. A student's right to seek amendment of the student's education records that the student believes to be inaccurate, misleading or otherwise in violation of the student's privacy rights.
3. A student's right to refuse consent of disclosures of personally identifiable information contained in the student's education records.
4. A student's right to file a complaint with the Department of Education's Family Policy Compliance Office concerning alleged failures by Unity Institute to comply with the requirements of the Act.
5. The procedure for exercising the right to inspect and review education records.
6. The procedure for a student to request amendment his or her records.

Grading Policies

All grades earned by the student become a part of his or her permanent record and will be shown on every transcript of credits issued by Unity Institute. Grades for completed academic work receive the following grade points per credit hour/continuing education unit:

A = 4

A-=3.67

B+=3.34

B = 3

B-=2.67

C+=2.34

C = 2

C-=1.67

D+=1.34

D = 1

D-=.067

F = 0

I = Incomplete (see section below on incomplete grades)

W = Withdrawal (see section below on withdrawal)

AU = Successful audit (see section below on auditing a class)

WA = Withdrawn or unsuccessful audit (see section below on auditing a class)

Graduation requires a 3.0 cumulative grade point average or above on a 4.0 scale. A maximum of six hours of a grade of C may be counted toward a degree. Grades below C may not be used to satisfy certificate requirements for core courses. Courses may be repeated in regularly scheduled terms (not as independent study). In such cases, both grades are posted and only the repeated grade is calculated in the term and cumulative grade point averages. Credit will be given only once toward graduation requirements.

Grade appeal: Grade appeals must first be discussed with the relevant faculty member. If the issue cannot be resolved with the faculty member, the student may submit an appeal in writing, with documentation, to the Dean within 16 working days of the faculty member's decision. If the issue involves the Dean as instructor, the student may appeal in writing, with documentation, to the Chair of the Academic Governance Council. After consulting with the faculty member, the decision of the Dean (Chair) is final and the matter is closed. Failure to initiate an appeal within the time frame indicates the student accepts the decision of the faculty member as final and further appeal is waived.

Grade point average: The Unity Institute grade point average (GPA) is calculated using the following formula: GPA equals the total grade points from courses taken at Unity Institute divided by the total credit hours (or units). Total grade points is the sum of the products of the credit hours (or units) of each course taken at Unity Institute multiplied by the grade point value of the grade earned in each course. Total credit hours (or units) are the sum of the credit hours taken at Unity Institute. The Unity Institute GPA is calculated using only courses taken for credit at Unity Institute. Transfer credit does not affect the Unity Institute GPA.

Incomplete grades: Faculty have the option of assigning the grade of “I” (incomplete) in situations involving serious illness or emergency that are beyond the control of the student. To receive the grade of Incomplete, a student must petition the instructor before the end of the course, stating the reasons for the incomplete grade. The request for an Incomplete, listing requirements for completing the course and the date that the course must be completed, must be signed by both the student and the instructor. The instructor, on this form, will assign a “replacement grade” that the student will receive if the course is not completed by the deadline. Students have up to two months from the last day of the term to complete the course. Failure to do so will result in the assignment of the “replacement grade.” Students facing extraordinary situations may, on the approval of the Dean, request an extension of another month to complete the course.

Satisfactory academic progress: Students who earn a grade point average equal to or greater than 3.0 per term will be considered making satisfactory progress. A student whose cumulative GPA falls below 3.0 or whose term GPA falls below 3.0 for two consecutive terms will result in the student being placed on academic probation and limited to a maximum of nine credit hours per ten-week term and a maximum of three credit hours per three-week term. Further unsatisfactory progress will result in a review of the student’s eligibility to continue in the program.

Withdrawal: If it is necessary for a student to withdraw from a course after the last day to drop, the student must complete the Petition for Excused Withdrawal form (available from the Registrar). Withdrawals after the last day to drop are approved only in the case of emergencies beyond the student’s control. Withdrawals are official when the form has been completed, returned to the Registrar and approved by the Dean. Students who do not officially withdraw from a course will receive a final grade of F. Provisions for continuing the program will be made on an individual basis, in consultation with the student’s advisor and the Dean.

Intellectual Property

Intellectual property created with the assistance of a student employed by Unity Institute (e.g., graduate assistant) is owned by the faculty member. Intellectual property created by a student as part of a requirement for a degree or certificate is owned by the student. Unity Institute retains the right to copy and store this material in its library and archives.

Library and Archives

Students have access to the Unity Library and Archives and can obtain a library card at the checkout desk. When a student is no longer enrolled in classes or graduates, all library materials are to be returned and any charges paid before grades or transcripts will be released. The library card may be converted to non-student status so that the library can be used, but without the expanded privileges given to students.

Orientation for New Students

Orientation for new students is held during the first week of the term. Students interested in attending orientation should contact the Registrar for more information.

Portfolio

All students will submit a portfolio prior to graduation. This portfolio is kept by Unity Institute and is used for assessment purposes only. The portfolio is to include one assignment from each course in the core curriculum, as identified by the faculty. Each assignment is to be titled with the course code and title, as well as term and year that the course was taken. The assignments are to be filed in chronological order, according to when the course was taken. The portfolio is to be kept in CD format and is to be submitted to the Registrar prior to graduation.

Sexual and Other Unlawful Harassment

It is the policy of Unity Institute to provide a study environment that is free of discrimination and unlawful harassment. Harassment may be actions, words, jokes or comments based on an individual's sex, race, ethnicity, age, religion, sexual orientation, disability and/or any other legally protected characteristic and will not be tolerated. Anyone engaging in any unlawful harassment will be subject to disciplinary action, up to and including dismissal from Unity Institute.

It is the responsibility of faculty, staff and students who become aware of possible sexual or other unlawful harassment to report the conduct to the Office of Human Resources. Investigation of all reports will proceed as described in the Code of Conduct Expectations and Adjudicatory Process.

Student Responsibility and Academic Advising

Students are responsible for knowing and abiding by the policies, procedures and requirements set forth in the Unity Institute Catalog, Student Handbook and published supplements. They are to meet graduation requirements from the catalog that is in effect at the time of their initial enrollment in a program at Unity Institute. Students wishing to change to a subsequent catalog may do so, provided they are enrolled when that catalog is in effect and they submit a written request to do so to the Registrar. Students reenrolling or completing graduate requirements after being out of school for more than one year are to meet graduation requirements from the catalog in effect at the time they apply for readmission.

The student is responsible to see that all courses are taken according to the program requirements laid out for his or her program of study and that all degree requirements are met. An academic advisor is assigned to each student to provide guidance concerning the student's academic program and to verify the accuracy of the course selections. The ultimate responsibility for knowing the program requirements and proceeding to satisfy these requirements in an orderly and timely manner is the student's.

Students are expected to govern their conduct by the accepted standards of behavior as outlined in the Unity Institute Code of Conduct. If a student shows continued violation of the Unity Institute Code of Conduct, Unity Institute reserves the right to request his or her withdrawal from the program.

Students with Questions or Concerns

Students with questions or concerns about registration, payment of account or any other enrollment issues should initially speak with the Registrar. Students with questions or concerns about a grade, an assignment or any other issue regarding a specific course should initially speak with the faculty member teaching that course. Students with questions or concerns about their progress in the program, any aspect of the program itself or the Licensing and Ordination path should initially speak with their advisor.

If the issue is not able to be resolved at these levels, the student may speak with the Dean. The student also has the option of exercising the appeal process.

Termination from the Program

Unity Institute reserves the right to dismiss a student from the program if his or her academic performance, attitude and/or behavior do not meet the standards prescribed in the Unity Institute Catalog and the Unity Institute Code of Conduct.

Appeal of Termination from the program may be presented to the Dean in writing, with documentation within 16 working days of receiving official notice of suspension at the conclusion of investigations or pending legal issues. If the Dean has been involved in the investigation leading to the probation, the Dean will immediately submit the appeal, with documentation, to the Chair of the Academic Governance Council, and notify the student. A decision will be given to the student in writing within eight working days of receipt to the Dean (or Chair, if necessary) of the student's appeal documentation. All appeals of termination will be reviewed by the Chair. The decision of the Chair is final and the matter is closed. Failure to initiate an appeal within the time frame indicates that the student accepts the decision of the faculty as final and further appeal is waived.

Time Commitment

As students are planning their course load each term, they should keep in mind that for every hour spent in the classroom, they will be expected to devote 2-3 hours outside of the classroom to reading, preparation and assignments for the course. Students are cautioned to manage their time and schedule extracurricular, employment and personal activities wisely.

Winter Storm Closing Policy

1. Normally Unity Institute will operate regardless of weather conditions.
2. The campus may be closed or classes and campus activities may be on a delayed schedule in the event of a severe winter storm that produces hazardous driving conditions over a significant portion of the metropolitan area. Closure of campus or a delayed schedule will be announced via the following:

3. If a severe winter storm develops during the day and there is a decision to close school, the campus closure will be announced as outlined in item 3, as well as an e-mail broadcast from a campus official and postings at entrances of campus buildings.

Withdrawal from School

If it is necessary for a student to withdraw from a course after the last day to drop, the student must complete the Petition for Excused Withdrawal form (available from the Registrar). Withdrawals after the last day to drop are approved only in the case of emergencies beyond the student's control. Withdrawals are official when the form has been completed, returned to the Registrar and approved by the Dean. Students who do not officially withdraw from a course will receive a final grade of F. Provisions for continuing the program will be made on an individual basis, in consultation with the student's advisor and the Dean.

STUDENT RESOURCES

Academic Advising

An academic advisor is assigned to all students to provide guidance concerning the student's academic program and spiritual development. Although the advisor will help verify the accuracy of the course selections, the ultimate responsibility for knowing program requirements and proceeding to satisfy these requirements in an orderly and timely manner is the student's.

Computers

A limited number of computers are available in the Unity Institute Library and Archives. Please see the Library staff for computer policies, guidelines and sign-in procedures.

A computer with Internet access and printer are available in the Student Lounge, lower level of Education Building.

Counseling

Periodic counseling is available to students with the faculty. Since students will be evaluated while enrolled at Unity Institute, students are strongly advised to use resources available in the community for in-depth counseling of a very personal nature. If a student wishes to be considered for financial support for psychological counseling, the student must be referred by a faculty member who has counseled the student. There is no guarantee of funding by Unity Institute. The content of counseling sessions is confidential.

Employment at Unity World Headquarters

Students who are interested in working at Unity world headquarters while they are attending classes should contact the Unity Human Resources Department for information about positions available and applications. Many students find that working in the Silent Unity prayer ministry is a valuable part of their Unity Institute experience.

Facsimile Services

Facsimile services, both sending and receiving, are available for students at the Spiritual Life Center at a nominal fee. That facsimile telephone number is 816-251-3556. Facsimiles may be sent to Unity Institute faculty and staff at 816-251-3555. The UI machine is not available for student use.

Fitness Center

Students may use the fitness center at Unity. The facility is open 24 hours a day and is equipped with circuit weight training with 17 Nautilus stations and a Smith machine. Free weights are also available. Treadmills, stationary bikes, and elliptical cross trainers provide opportunities for cardiovascular training. A trainer is available to students at a reduced cost. A 30-minute orientation and signed waiver are required to prior to use.

Housing at Unity Village

Very limited on-ground housing (short-term and long-term) is available on a first-come, first-served basis after acceptance into the Unity Institute academic and certificate programs. Most are one-room units with a common kitchen and bathroom. The current monthly rate is \$140 (plus last month's rent and security deposit) which includes utilities and a phone. There are a couple of units suitable to house a student and his or her spouse/partner at the rate of \$420 per month (last month's rent and security deposit)—one of these is off campus and is approved for small pets and would require a pet deposit. Students who desire a private phone, separate from the main Unity phone number, may install their own at their expense. Coin-operated laundry facilities are available on grounds. Pets are not allowed in on-campus dormitories, and cable TV is currently not available. Medical Services

There is no health or medical facilities at Unity Village. It is suggested that students select a doctor, dentist and hospital for use before emergency care may be needed.

Unity Institute strongly encourages students to maintain adequate health insurance while they are in school. Information packets about the health and dental insurance plans available through Unity insurance carriers can be obtained from the Registrar.

Packages

You will be notified via e-mail if a package arrives for you. It is your responsibility to pick up your package at the receiving dock within 48 hours of your notification. Pick-up times are 7:45-9:a.m. and 3:15-4:p.m. Please call Ext. 3471 or 3630 before picking up a package. Please do not go into the receiving 'cage' if no one is around. This space is used for *all* Unity incoming material. Please be aware of forklift traffic when using this area.

Personal Property Tax

If Missouri is your "fixed place of residence for the time being" on the first day of January of each year, you are subject to pay a personal property tax on your automobile, as well as other "personal property" (as defined by law you may have in your possession within the state).

Spiritual Education and Enrichment Classes

Students and/or their partners are invited to take Spiritual Education and Enrichment classes. These classes may assist the student in creating the foundation necessary for his or her program of study and will help the partner better understand Unity spiritual principles.

Registration is required for each SEE course. Students and/or their partners will pay a registration fee of \$36 per person per class. There is no tuition charge. Perfect attendance is mandatory to obtain credit for the course. Students are reminded that units earned in SEE do not transfer into any of the graduate or certificate programs at Unity Institute and will not be recorded on their official transcripts.

Contact the SEE registrar for information.

Student Association

The student body has its own organization, known as the Unity Institute Student Association (UISA). This association elects its own officers, comprises service committees and conducts regular meetings. The purpose of the organization is to promote fellowship and cooperation between students and the faculty and to represent the interests of students at Unity Institute. All students are encouraged to participate in class meetings, projects, programs and social events sponsored by the Student Association.

Student Identification Card

Students will be issued an identification card. This identification card can be used to receive discounts at the Unity Bookstore, to become a member of the Unity Country Club, to provide security documentation, and to enable students to receive discounts at various area entertainment centers and other places where student discounts are recognized.

Student Lounge

The lounge, located on the lower floor of the Education Building, is marked Private and is for the use of students only. Some of the resources in the lounge include:

- Lockers: Each student is assigned a locker. Students should make use of their lockers by putting their books and other possessions there rather than leaving them in the classrooms or hallways. Lockers are Unity Institute property and may be opened and searched by Unity Institute staff if deemed necessary.
- Mailboxes: Each student is assigned a mailbox. It is important for students to develop the habit of checking their mailboxes on a regular basis.
- Bulletin boards: Official notices and communications pertaining to classes will be posted on the official bulletin board. Please check the bulletin board each day for new information. A separate bulletin board has been designated for student activities and miscellaneous notices. No notices are to be put on either board unless the Registrar approves them.
- Telephone: The phone in the lounge may be used to make on-ground and local calls. An outside line can be reached by dialing nine.
- Copy machine: Students may use the copy machine in the lounge on a love-offering basis. Please report any problems with the machine to the Unity

Institute office. (Machines are also available in the Library and in the Copy Center on the second floor of the Administration Building.) The UI machine is not available for student use.

- Computer with Internet access and printer are available for student use.

Telephone Messages

Telephone messages for a student are placed in that student's mailbox as soon as received. When a telephone caller identifies their need to reach a student as an emergency, that message will be relayed to the student as soon as he or she can be located. Campus personnel have been instructed NOT to give out a student's phone numbers to someone seeking a student by telephone. Campus personnel will take the caller's information and treat it as any other telephone message and place it in the student's mailbox.

Unity Bookstore

The staff at the Unity Bookstore is here to serve the students of Unity Institute. Students receive a 20 percent discount on Unity publications and most non-Unity publications and merchandise. The bookstore is eager to assist students with their book needs for each term. Special orders can be made at the bookstore for other titles besides textbooks. Returns are accepted on items with receipts, except for special orders, which cannot be returned, and textbooks, which must be returned prior to the 2nd day that the course meets. The bookstore accepts Visa, Discover, MasterCard and American Express.

Unity Country Club

All Unity Institute students are welcome to become members of the Unity Country Club for an annual fee of \$35. Membership includes access to the swimming pool and 9-hole golf course. If the student chooses to purchase a Missouri fishing license, fishing is available on grounds for an annual key rental of \$1.

Unity Library and Archives

The Unity Library and Archives is the information and research center for the Unity movement. Print, audiovisual and electronic resources are available. Staffing includes two professional librarians, professional archivist, support staff and volunteers. Interlibrary loan services are maintained through the Kansas City Metropolitan Library and Information Network (KCMLIN). Internet access is available through several public access computers located throughout the library and archives.

The Unity Library and Archives is recognized as one of the largest metaphysical libraries in the United States. It contains:

- The only primary source collection of historical materials relating to the Unity movement and the most complete collection of Unity publications, periodicals and products anywhere.
- Rare collections of early New Thought materials.
- Extensive collections relating to metaphysics and mysticism; philosophy and religion; Christianity and the Bible; health and healing; New Age, self-help and inspiration; and many general works.
- Works from various esoteric spiritual schools and teachings.

The Unity Library and Archives is a unique spiritual and educational resource that supports:

- Unity Institute.
- Spiritual Education and Enrichment.
- Unity ministers and our sister organization, the Association of Unity Churches International.
- Individual retreat guests and visitors who come to Unity Village seeking information and inspiration to support their spiritual growth.
- Unity departments and employees in their research and educational needs.
- Individuals living in the greater Kansas City metropolitan area.
- Researchers who reach us in person, by mail, telephone and e-mail.

CLASSROOM CONDUCT

Cell Phones and Other Electronic Devices

When using laptop computers and carrying cell phones, students should reduce noise, as a courtesy to others. It is suggested that students turn off the sound on computers and ask any person sitting near them whether the noise of typing will interfere with hearing lectures and class discussion. As a courtesy, cell phones should be turned off or may be set to vibration mode, if a student anticipates an emergency call. If a situation arises where students are expecting a call or are on call for a ministry setting, students should inform the instructor that they might need to leave the classroom to answer a call. Calls should not be answered in the classroom, and students should seek a place outside the classroom to talk without interrupting others.

Disruptive Behavior

Students may be asked to leave the classroom if their behavior is, in the opinion of the faculty member, disruptive to the learning environment. Continued disruptive behavior may be cause for dismissal from the course with a grade of F, academic probation or dismissal from the program.

Food and Beverage Policy

Beverages, as well as food in moderation, are allowed in the classroom, at the faculty member's discretion.

Visitors in Class

A visitor is defined as someone who is not enrolled in a course (for credit or audit) and wishes to attend a class session. Visitors may be admitted into a class session at the discretion of the faculty member, with *at least three days notice*.

CAMPUS POLICIES

Accident and Medical Emergency Procedures

Unity School has a trained medical emergency team who respond to all accidents and medical emergencies that occur on grounds. If an accident or medical emergency occurs:

Who to Call

- Contact Security immediately following any accident that occurs on Unity grounds—even if the student does not want you to contact anyone. Call Security on Ext. 2222 if life threatening or Ext. 3355 if not life threatening. **Security should be called even if the student does not need medical attention.**
- **NOTE: Residents**—All Unity Village residents who are involved in an emergency, dial 911 if you have your own (7) digit phone number. For residents who have only a (4) digit Unity extension number, dial 2222 for Security emergency. Please remember to stay on the phone line until you are instructed to hang up.
- A MERT (Medical Emergency Response Team) member will respond to a medical emergency called by Security (life threatening or not life threatening). Ambulance services will be called for any serious or life threatening emergencies.

Transportation

- A MERT member or Security Officer will determine the seriousness of a student's medical condition and, if needed, the mode of transportation. Security arranges for transportation.
- Any student experiencing a life-threatening medical condition will be transported by ambulance to the Lee's Summit Hospital Emergency Room.

Follow-Up

- A "First Report of Incident" must be completed by Unity Institute staff for any student who experiences any illness, injury, near miss or any incident involving property damage while at work. Please forward this report to the Safety & Health Officer within 24 business hours.

Alcohol and Drug Abuse Policies

It is the policy of Unity Institute to be concerned about the abuse of alcohol and drugs because of the negative impact on the student's life. Furthermore, the hazards posed to other students and employees by an individual under the influence of alcohol or drugs are a matter of great concern requiring timely and decisive action.

Alcoholic beverages (unless approved by the Executive Committee for a special event pursuant to the Unity Special Event Alcohol Policy) and/or any type of drug not prescribed by a medical doctor, including illegal substances, are strictly prohibited on Unity property.

A student will be subject to immediate disciplinary action if he or she is:

- Under the influence of these substances while at school.

- Carrying or possessing these substances, whether on his or her person or in Unity Institute property assigned to him or her, such as lockers and desks.
- Purchasing, selling, delivering or receiving these substances on the premises.
- Failing to cooperate in the efforts of Unity to investigate drug or alcohol use, including submitting to drug and/or alcohol screening tests upon the request of Unity Institute.

If the student volunteers the information that he or she has an alcohol or drug problem, he or she will be encouraged to get help at his or her expense. Counseling is available through an outside agency such as the National Council of Alcoholism and Drugs. The student must, in addition to other disciplinary action, be willing to have the counselor confirm the student is receiving treatment to continue with his or her classes.

Fire Procedures

In the event of a fire, sirens will sound. Instructions will be given over the PA system concerning the location of the fire and orders will be given to exit through the nearest door. There are two fire escapes for the second floor of the Education Building, one on the north side (outside the conference room #227) and one on the southwest side. The fire escapes for the first floor of the Education Building are the nearest exit doors. The fire escapes for the lower level of the Education Building are at the top of the center stairs. In the event of a fire, do not use the elevators.

Parking

The designated student parking area is located to the north of the Education Building. Students are asked not to park in the cafeteria, Silent Unity, southeast, southwest or Tower parking areas. Students with handicap parking permits may park in any handicap designated parking spot on campus.

Policy of Nondiscrimination

In keeping with the inclusive nature of the Unity teachings, it is the policy of Unity Institute that Unity will be free of discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, age, sexual orientation and/or disability. Students with questions or concerns related to discrimination or harassment at Unity Institute are encouraged to bring these issues to the attention of the Dean of Unity Institute. Students making good faith reports may be assured that their concerns will be addressed without fear of reprisal.

Promotional Materials

From time to time, candid, posed and staged photographs and/or videos of students are taken. Students sign media releases as part of enrollment, releasing Unity Institute from any and all claims. These photos and/or videos may be used, at the discretion of Unity, in promotional materials without compensation to the students. Promotional material may include publications in print, Internet and audiovisual media, brochures and press releases.

Reasonable Accommodations for Students with Disabilities

Unity Institute continues to develop policies and resources to insure persons who are differently-abled may participate fully in student life at Unity Institute. Students with documented disabilities who are otherwise qualified students will be

afforded an equal opportunity to participate in and benefit from all education programs and activities at Unity Institute. This policy is in compliance with Section 504 of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973, in anticipation of federally insured loans being made available to Unity Institute students.

Students or potential students seeking accommodation should contact the Office of the Dean for information necessary for medical documentation of disabilities, which is required before assessing any reasonable accommodation. After medical documentation has been received, the Office of the Dean will make a determination whether the student has a qualifying disability. The determination of the Office of the Dean is final. If the condition of the student changes, additional information may be provided to the Office and a new determination requested.

After a determination that the student has a qualifying disability, reasonable accommodations will be determined in consultation with internal and external resources. The Office of the Dean will work with the student and any outside resources in developing appropriate contracts, if needed, and assessing the adequacy of the accommodation. If the student's needs change, additional medical documentation should be provided to the Office of the Dean before a revised plan of accommodation can be evaluated.

Student Disability Documentation: Students requesting accommodation based on disability must be "otherwise qualified" and must initially meet all academic and technical standards required for admission. In assessing whether or not a student has a qualifying disability and whether or not reasonable accommodations can be made, Unity Institute must have documentation provided by the student which includes the following elements:

- A licensed or credentialed examiner providing assessments within the past three years appropriate for the specific disability being claimed
- A diagnostic statement identifying the specific disability. Note that diagnosis alone may not automatically qualify as a disability.
- A description of the diagnostic methodology including testing methods and results as appropriate.
- A description of the functional limitations of the disability as it relates to academic performance and life on campus.
- A description of the expected duration and progression of the condition.
- A description of any medication currently prescribed and their potential side effects as they relate to academic performance.
- A rationale and justification for all requested accommodations including specific auxiliary aids or services being requested.

Please note that it is the student's responsibility to obtain all testing and examinations necessary to provide documentation of disability and assessment of appropriate accommodations. Prior IEP's (Individualized Education Plans) or 504 Plans may be helpful but are not sufficient documentation of the disability. Reports should be typed and dated, on letterhead and have the original signature of the evaluator. Reports not originally in English must have a translation signed by a certified translator.

Unity Institute reserves the right to request additional information or clarification before making a final determination regarding a student's qualifying disability status or reasonable accommodation.

Student Accommodation Request: Students requesting accommodation are to provide a written request, signed and dated listing the specific accommodations they are requesting, how the accommodation facilitates their academic success and any resources they have identified, if appropriate, to provide requested auxiliary aids or services. All documentation and requests should be provided to the Office of the Dean. As assessment and identification of accommodations may take time, so advance notice is recommended.

Restricted Areas

The lower level of the Administration Building has been designated as a storage area for Unity materials, and forklift traffic in this area is heavy. To ensure the safety of students, access to the first floor is restricted from the Unity Bookstore to the west end of the Administration Building. Please observe any additional restricted areas or barriers.

Scheduling Extracurricular Activities

Students who plan extracurricular activities or want to use a room at Unity world headquarters will need to consult with the Dean's Executive Assistant, who will assist in making arrangements. All extracurricular activities and use of rooms must be preapproved. Entrance to the buildings after hours is not permitted unless prearranged.

Searches

It is the policy of Unity Institute to safeguard the security and property of students. In furtherance of this policy, Unity reserves the right to question students and all other persons entering and leaving our premises and to conduct searches for controlled substances, alcohol, firearms, weapons and Unity property. Inspections may be conducted at any time at the discretion of Unity regardless of whether the item or area is locked and regardless of whether the lock belongs to Unity or the student; therefore, students should not bring any item which they do not want to undergo an inspection onto Unity property.

Security

The Unity Security Department is responsible for safety and welfare of everyone on grounds. Its function is to remind people of and enforce certain rules and regulations. The following are some of the regulations of which students should be aware:

1. A 20-m.p.h. speed limit is enforced on all streets and roads in Unity Village 24 hours a day.
2. All stop and yield signs are to be observed.
3. "No Parking" areas at crosswalks, fire hydrants, entrances to buildings and so on and "Reserved Parking" signs are to be observed.
4. After 11 p.m., security officers will question unrecognized drivers and restrict driving through the Village, on side streets and around private residences.
5. Prior arrangements are to be made with the Security Department before leaving your car overnight in any parking lot or street in Unity Village (unless you are

- a permanent resident).
6. All laws of the state of Missouri relating to ownership and operation of a vehicle will apply in Unity Village, including valid driver's license and current license plates.

Smoking Policy

All Unity buildings are smoke-free. Smoking is not permitted in restrooms, classrooms, offices, hallways or lounges. The designated smoking area for the Education Building is in the covered patio area east of the first floor of the Library. A list of designated smoking areas is posted on Unity bulletin boards and is available from the Registrar. Do not smoke while walking from one smoking area to another.

Solicitation and In-House Selling

It is the policy of Unity Institute to ensure a productive and harmonious study environment. Soliciting of funds for other charities or selling services on Unity Institute grounds by students is not allowed. Outside salespersons are not allowed to solicit students for any reason. Anyone seen selling products or soliciting funds from students on grounds should be reported to the Dean or the Security Department.

Tornado Procedures

The weather bureau offers two types of information in relation to tornadoes:

1. Tornado watch: This information is issued when conditions are favorable for the formation of tornadoes. The watch usually covers a wide area, indicating that only general alertness should be maintained.
2. Tornado warning: This information is issued only when a tornado has been sighted and is headed toward the local vicinity. A tornado warning indicates that cover should be taken immediately.

Unity maintains constant contact with the weather bureau during severe weather conditions. If a tornado warning should go into effect, a siren within the buildings will sound, and you will be instructed to take your purse/wallet with you and move immediately to a designated safety area. Students who are in the Education Building are to go down the center stairway to the lower level. Do not use the elevators.

Students who are in another building when a siren sounds may follow the direction of the other people, who have been given specific instructions for their area. Students who are in residence here are to take cover in the nearest basement or tunnel area when the sirens sound from the outside speakers or a Unity patrol car. In the cottages, students may go to the basement next to the laundry area under the southeast corner of the motel complex.

INFORMATION FOR STUDENTS ON THE UNITY MINISTRY PATH

Chapel Services

Students on the Unity Ministry Path are required to complete at least two chapel services. Students are expected to prepare, manage, and lead the service as they would in a church, and the service is to be designed for a general Unity/New Thought audience.

Prerequisites for students to lead a chapel service include:

HTS 551	Metaphysical Theology I
MAS 521	Homiletics I
MAS 522	Homiletics II
MAS 533	Creating Special Services (prior to second service)

Students are to schedule their first chapel service to take place sometime between completion of 30-60 credit hours or 35-50 continuing education units. Students are to schedule their second chapel service to take place after completion of 75 credit hours or 110 continuing education units.

Requirements of Chapel Services

1. Each chapel service is required to include, at a minimum, the following elements:
 - Welcome
 - Opening prayer
 - Music
 - Meditation
 - Message
 - Offering blessing
 - Closing prayer
 - Meet and greet
2. Students are required to lead all of the required elements of the chapel service, except music.
3. The topic of the message is to be appropriate to a general Unity/New Thought congregation
4. Students are required to meet with the communication faculty in advance of the chapel service to discuss how the elements of the service and the technical requirements will be met.

Logistics of the Chapel Services

1. Chapel services are held in the Fillmore Chapel.
2. Chapel services are held at 4 p.m. on Wednesdays.
3. The service is to be approximately 45 minutes in length.

Evaluation of the Chapel Services

Chapel services are not linked to a specific course and, therefore, are not given a letter grade. However, chapel services will be evaluated to provide students with opportunities for growth in this aspect of ministry.

Evaluations will be given by:

1. The faculty member teaching homiletics.

2. The student's advisor.
3. Another faculty member chosen by the student.

The student will meet individually with each member of the evaluation team to receive the feedback. Students are expected to integrate the feedback received from their first chapel service into their second (or additional) chapel services. A copy of the evaluations are to be submitted by students in their portfolio.

Credentialed Leader Ministry Review Team

The Credentialed Leader Ministry Review Team (CLMRT) of the Association of Unity Churches International process may be implemented with any student on the ministerial path who is a licensed Unity teacher or spiritual leader of a Unity church. Educational and Psychological Evaluation

Unity Institute reserves the right to require an educational and/or psychological evaluation of ministerial students, at Unity Institute expense, should the faculty believe it would be useful to help the student on his or her ministerial path. The results of such evaluations will be kept in the student's permanent file and shared with the student.

Evaluation and Accountability

Each student will receive ongoing evaluation of his or her progress, as identified in the section "Ministerial Presence Evaluation." The objective of this evaluation process is to engage the student in responsible self-understanding and self-observation, which serve as a springboard for further spiritual growth and development.

Students are placed "under review" when, in the judgment of the faculty or administration, their scholarship drops below a satisfactory level or when their conduct is considered by Unity Institute faculty to be below standard. Within two weeks of being placed under review, the student will jointly create an Individual Educational Program (IEP) with his or her advisor to help the student raise the quality of his or her academic, behavioral and/or spiritual developmental work to a satisfactory level. The IEP will include a date at which the faculty will assess the progress made by the student. Three outcomes are possible at this assessment. First, the faculty determines that satisfactory progress has been made and the student is taken off review. Second, the faculty determines that the student is making progress but more is needed. The student remains under review. At this point, a revised IEP will be created which will include a date at which the faculty will reassess the progress made by the student. Third, the faculty determines that the student has not met the terms of the IEP and the student is placed on probation.

Students who are placed on probation will work with their advisor to create a revised IEP, which will include a date at which the faculty will assess the progress made by the student. In addition, students on probation will be required to:

- Take no more than nine credit hours (12 continuing education units) in a ten-week term and no more than three credit hours (four continuing education units) in a three-week term.
- Immediately discontinue any involvement with a Unity church, including being a spiritual leader, speaking, teaching and serving as a platform assistant.
- Immediately discontinue any participation in the Students' Association or any student committees.
- Meet with their advisor at least every two weeks to discuss how they are addressing the concerns of the faculty.

When the faculty assesses the student's progress, three outcomes are possible. First, the faculty determines that satisfactory progress has been made and the student is taken off probation. Second, the faculty determines that the student is making progress but more is needed. The student remains on probation. At this point, a revised IEP will be created which will include a date at which the faculty will reassess the progress made by the student. Third, the faculty determines that the student has not met the terms of the IEP and the student is dismissed from the program.

At all stages of this process, students may appeal the decision of the faculty. Students choosing to appeal must present their statement in writing, with appropriate documentation, to the Dean within four weeks of receiving notification of their status. The Dean will determine whether the student may continue to take classes during the appeal process. The Dean will take no more than four weeks to review the appeal and make a decision. Students may choose to appeal the decision of the Dean. Students choosing to appeal the decision of the Dean must present their statement in writing, with appropriate documentation, to the Chair of the Academic Governance Council within four weeks of receiving notification of the Dean's decision. The Chair will take no more than four weeks to review the appeal and make a decision. The decision of the Chair is final. Failure to initiate an appeal within the four-week period indicates that the student accepts the decision and the matter is closed.

Ministerial Presence Evaluation

A ministerial student's competence in the qualities of leadership identified below will be evaluated throughout the program.

Ministerial Presence Qualities

Listening Skills: Students on the ministerial path listen with empathy, respect and sensitivity. They keep confidence and express themselves using compassionate communication skills.

Interpersonal/Relationship Skills: Ministerial students meet and accept others where they are. They are able to nurture others, give and receive love and form healthy relationships, friendships and support systems.

Attitude: Ministerial students display positive thinking and have a positive self-image. They are willing to receive feedback, learn and change. They demonstrate self-confidence and have a sense of humor and an ability to play.

Leadership Skills: Students on the ministerial path model the use of spiritual principles, display flexibility and are open to diversity. They empower others, participate in decision making and help build community.

Responsibility: Accepting responsibility without blame or projection on others is an important skill for ministerial students. They acknowledge their mistakes and “walk their talk” by living according to spiritual principles. They are willing to be introspective and accept coaching for personal growth and improvement.

Self-Discipline: Ministerial students use prayer in their daily lives. In addition, they maintain healthy boundaries, are able to think before speaking, demonstrate a prosperity consciousness and practice self-care.

Maturity: Students on the ministerial path show evidence of emotional stability and are able to resolve personal issues using spiritual principles. They act in integrity and demonstrate honesty and trustworthiness.

Personal Transformation Advising

To assist students on the journey of personal transformation, those students on the Unity Ministry Path will complete a self-evaluation, based on the qualities of ministerial presence listed above, each 10-week term that they are enrolled for courses. They will meet with their advisor during the 10-week term to discuss their strengths and challenges in achieving and/or maintaining the qualities of ministerial presence. Advisors are in an advisory, rather than evaluative, capacity in this process, but will make note of the student’s willingness to follow through with this personal transformational process. Students are encouraged to see the self-evaluation as an opportunity for continued personal growth and preparation for ministry.

The timeline for this process is as follows:

1. First week of the 10-week term: The self-evaluation form will be distributed by the Registrar to all students enrolled for the term.
2. Third week of the 10-week term: The students are to complete the form and return them to their advisor.
3. Between the fourth and tenth week of the 10-week term: Students are to make an appointment with their advisor to review the self-evaluation. It is the students’ responsibility to follow-through with this process every 10-week term in which they are enrolled. The specific content of the self-evaluation will be kept confidential, with the exception of any legal requirements for disclosure when the potential for harm of self or others is perceived. The advisor’s perceptions of the student’s willingness to engage in the process of self-evaluation will be shared with the student and may be shared with the Unity Institute Advisory Team if the advisor feels it is warranted.
4. The self-evaluations will be kept in the student’s file in their advisor’s office. The specific content of the self-evaluations will be kept confidential, with the exception of any legal requirements for disclosure involving the potential harm of self or others.
5. At any time, faculty and staff have the opportunity to share any observed strengths and/or challenges of ministerial presence that they witness of students who are not their advisees. Should such an experience occur, faculty and staff will share this information with the student and his or her advisor. The student and his or her advisor will work together to identify ways to grow through any observed challenges.

Participation at Unity Churches

Students who are accepted into the Licensing and Ordination Path at Unity Institute become representatives of the greater Unity movement. Students are expected to maintain excellent decorum and ethics at every event in which they participate both within and outside of Unity Institute. This includes their participation at Unity churches (spiritual leaders, speakers, teachers, platform assistants or in any official and/or voluntary capacity). Students who do not represent Unity Institute and/or the Unity movement in an appropriate manner or who are on probation at Unity Institute, as determined by the faculty, will be required to immediately discontinue their participation. Failure to discontinue their participation at a Unity church will result in immediate dismissal. Students may appeal this decision, according to the appeal process listed in the section under “Evaluation and Accountability.”

Unity Licensing and Ordination

The Association of Unity Churches International governs the process of licensing and ordaining Unity ministers. Graduation from Unity Institute does not guarantee licensing or ordination. Students interested in Unity licensing and ordination are required to be in residence full-time at Unity Institute for two consecutive ten-week terms at some point during the program. The Association of Unity Churches International recommends that students interested in Unity licensing and ordination also spend a third ten-week term consecutively in residence at Unity Institute.
